

Healing the Divide

I am struck by the sheer volume of divisive speech in our public discourse. I will even confess to going out of my way to avoid hearing as much of it as possible. It wears me down and it makes me sad.

One of the voices that I lean on for encouragement belongs to the priest, psychologist and professor, Henri Nouwen. He shares this bit of wisdom for contentious times:

"Praying for One's Enemies"

*I find it difficult to conceive of a more concrete way to love than by praying for one's enemies. It makes you conscious of the hard fact that, in God's eyes, you're no more and no less worthy of being loved than any other person, and it creates an awareness of profound solidarity with all other human beings. It creates in you a world-embracing compassion and provides you in increasing measure with a heart free of the compulsive urge to coercion and violence. And you'll be delighted to discover that you can no longer remain angry with people for whom you've really and truly prayed. You will find that you start speaking differently to them or about them, and that you're actually willing to do well to those who've offended you in some way. PEACE & GLOBAL WITNESS OFFERING WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY, OCTOBER 7, 2018

A gift to the **Peace & Global Witness Offering** enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering is received during the Season of Peace which ends on World Communion Sunday. It joins Presbyterians together as active peacemakers; enabling the church to promote the peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice in our own community and across the world. Please give as generously as possible to this special offering.

Sunday, September 9, after church: *Campfire Construction, cont'd.*



The Session met in its regular meeting on August 14. The meeting began with a devotional presented by Fitz Sthresley. Fitz reminded the Session that we are sometimes motivated by fear. Our help comes from God that can allow us to overcome fear. He then opened the meeting in prayer

The Session celebrated the coming of new members Eric McAnallen and Dioclese Wells on July 8, 2018, and Billie Hicklin on July 29, 2018. The Session approved the transfer of June Stoll to First Presbyterian Church of Gainesville GA. The deaths of Lillis Brackett on July 7, 2018, Robert Shelly on July 14, 2018, and David Arnold on August 3, 2018, were noted.

Dwight Christenbury provided a report of his activities for the past two months. Dwight expressed special thanks to Kathie and Fred Van Itallie for their hospitality in hosting the youth retreat, and to Beth Miller who participated as an adult adviser. Dwight informed Session that he will be participating in a program leading to a Certificate in Community Organizing and Congregational Leadership at Christ Lutheran Church, Baltimore, Maryland, on October 22–26, 2018. Following this meeting the program includes six months of distance learning. Dwight anticipates that what he learns through this program will be valuable in the future of his ministry.

Mark Stanley provided a report of his activities over the past two months. Particular emphasis has been placed on visits with members of the congregation as a part of pastoral care. Mark participated in the Heart of Hendersonville program, along with several members of the congregation.

Tom Karvonen and Ed Spencer provided a status report of the work of the study group that is looking into the possibility of installing solar panels at Trinity. The group plans to continue their research, but no commitments will be made prior to receiving appropriate approvals.

A group working on a new web site has made significant progress. Emphasis is being placed on making the web site welcoming to visitors.

The Session was pleased to endorse Karen Burnham to attend the Church Leadership School. We wish her well as she undertakes this challenging program.

The Endowment Committee will be working with the various ministries of Trinity that receive endowment funds to prepare spending plans for the use of those funds. The desire is to ensure that the funds are being used to the benefit of the church and our mission programs.

Finance Ministry reported that Trinity has had sufficient receipts so far this year, but some of that resulted from prepaid Estimates of Giving early in the year. However, the current run rate of giving is lower than necessary to meet the annual budget. Finance Ministry will be closely monitoring this situation.

HOW TO LIVE A MEANINGFUL LIFE

Many Americans live with two opposite feelings. On one hand, they want to experience meaning and purpose in their lives. On the other hand, they often feel they are running on empty.

In his classic novel, *Les Miserables*, Victor Hugo tells us how to eliminate that second feeling. The bishop befriends Jean Valjean and gives him lodging. Valjean repays that kindness by stealing the bishop’s valuable candlesticks. After the bishop reports the theft, the police magistrate questions Valjean in the bishop’s presence. As the interrogation progresses, Valjean seems headed for jail. At that point, the bishop unexpectedly retracts his charges and offers a plausible reason why the candlesticks are missing.

Jean Valjean is amazed. When he and the bishop are alone, he says, “Why did you do that? You know I am guilty.”

The bishop replies, “Life is for giving.”

Why do churches receive an offering in their worship services? Some people say, “Because the church needs the money.” That is only part of the answer. Even if a wealthy benefactor underwrote our congregation’s expenses, we would still need to provide people with the opportunity to give an offering in our worship services. Weekly giving teaches us—and reminds us because we keep forgetting—that life without unselfish giving is life without meaning and purpose.

Victor Hugo is right. Life is for giving.

- decoding the weather, in a video and Q&A presented by Carl Schreck III, and
- the possible economic and environmental issues of Trinity using solar energy to reduce our energy bill, reduce our carbon footprint, and help protect God’s gift of the Earth.

“So what?” was further answered when the question for Trinity to continue exploring the use of solar energy was posed to those attending and surveys returned showed 61 strongly agree, 9 agree, 1 agree/undecided, 1 undecided, 0 disagree, and 0 strongly disagree.

This was not a scientific survey, but the participation and encouragement by so many in our congregation gives strong push to keep on exploring solar energy. Through 58% of the year, we have received 60% of budgeted Estimates of Giving (EOGs). We are behind about \$19,000 in EOG donations compared to this time in 2017.

Plate and unpledged donations are \$3700 over budget.

Most ministries are under budget in their spending so far this year, especially Buildings & Grounds, Personnel (staff mileage), and Office Admin.

Work continues on providing electronic giving options for members.

GLOBAL MISSIONS

Center for Development in Central America - Nicaragua

The Center for Development in Central America's mission is to enable communities to become self-sufficient, sustainable, democratic entities. Its primary focus is in Ciudad Sandino, the most densely populated city in Nicaragua, and one of the poorest. Ciudad Sandino has long been the dumping ground for refugees from natural disasters and violence. CDCA's areas of focus are:

- Sustainable Agriculture
- Sustainable Economic Development
- Health Care
- Education

Sarah Junkin Woodard represented the CDCA in visits to Trinity in 2017 and 2018. She gave presentations on the CDCA's goals and projects and led an excellent discussion on the country's long and short-term history. She may best be remembered by the wonderful collection of fair-traded crafts and jewelry she was selling on behalf of Nicaraguan artisans.

We recently received an email from Sarah detailing the impacts of the recent political unrest and violence that are sweeping Nicaragua. There are over 200 dead, and many have been injured in protests, looting, road blocks, and gang violence. With road closures and the disruption of local commerce, all the requirements of daily life are increasing in cost: food, transportation, housing, and medical care. Often forgotten amid turmoil and crisis are the most vulnerable, the poor and voiceless, and these are the populations CDCA seeks to serve. CDCA's budget has been severely impacted, and Sarah has requested our help in meeting this immediate crisis.

Trinity is blessed to have endowment fund earnings that we can tap to respond to on-going issues as well as special needs. The Global Mission Ministry will be sending \$1000 from unrestricted endowment fund earnings to the CDCA in September, in addition to the \$1000 that was previously budgeted.

GLOBAL MISSIONS

CEDEPCA (Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America)

The Rev. Leslie Vogel was featured at a pot luck dinner at TPC in July. She reported on CEDEPCA, a Central American mission organization with a large presence in Guatemala. CEDEPCA is one of the mission organizations that Trinity regularly supports, this year with a \$2000 donation in June. CEDEPCA's major areas of focus include:

- Disaster Ministry
- Intercultural Encounters
- Women's Ministry
- Biblical and Theological Study

On Sunday, June 3, 2018, the Fuego Volcano erupted, generating columns of ash as high as 6.2 miles above sea level. This volcano is located 27 miles southeast of Guatemala City, and typically dominates the horizon with its cloud of ash and smoke. The June eruption featured pyroclastic flows of lava and mud that enveloped homes, highways, and bridges, and destroyed harvests of corn, coffee, and beans.

Guatemala's national disaster relief organization estimated there to be 12,000 evacuees, 113 dead, and 329 missing. Other relief organizations estimate the number of dead and missing to be at least 2,900.

Rev. Vogel reported on this additional and very immediate mission for CEDEPCA. While they were able to make a first response to the volcanic eruptions, their general fund was severely depleted. They have joined ACT Alliance to respond to this crisis in an emergency response that is anticipated to last from June 2018 to July 2019. This program will include:

- Community-Based Psychosocial Care
- Distribution of Personal Hygiene Kits
- Promotion of Hygiene and Solid Waste Disposal
- Courses on Empowerment and Resiliency for Women
- Cash Transfers

In recognition of this new disaster in a country with which we at Trinity have strong ties, and in appreciation of the excellent stewardship CEDEPCA provides, TPC's Global Mission Ministry, in their August meeting, agreed to support CEDEPCA's work with an additional \$1,000, to be paid immediately. This additional support will come from the restricted earnings of the Spenser endowment funds.

A RECYCLE REMINDER

When recyclables are soiled by remnants of food or drink **OR** when non-recyclable items are put in the recycling container, contamination occurs. A quick tip is to empty and clean any containers that are to be recycled.

We can recycle paper, magazines, cardboard, household plastics (#1-#7), metal cans, glass bottles. Remember, we save our aluminum cans for **Scholarships for Guatemala** (drop-offs first Sundays of every month in Carole's pickup).

We can not recycle aluminum foil, wax paper, plastic wrap, plastic bags, paper towels, tissues, frozen food boxes, pizza boxes or any box/container contaminated by food, or Styrofoam.

Some of our coffee cups are compostable – they are ECO products and have “compostable” on them. We can keep them out of the landfill by placing them in the small designated containers near wastebaskets when they are empty.

What is the Global Village At Camp Grier??

An event at the **Global Village (GV)** at Camp Grier will be held on **Saturday, September 8**. Our Global Village will help you understand life for our neighbors in developing countries around the world. Please save the date and time, and plan to join us if you're able.

Starting / Ending time: **9:00 - 2:30**. (Those interested may want to stay a little later to do some gardening or other work.)

Purpose: Trial for some of Global Village curriculum, inform members of PWNC churches on progress, and future plans at the GV.

Background: The Global Village project at Camp Grier was largely borne out of needs recognized during PWNC international mission team visits and discussions among many members beginning years ago. It is meant as a means to educate, and bring together members of Christ's church here in western North Carolina as we plan and participate in global ministry. Since last year additional improvements have been made. The kitchen area has been expanded, the ram pump is getting water from Jarrett Creek up to the tank uphill from the kitchen, and by September we expect to be catching and distributing rainwater and to be able to use one of the fuel-efficient stoves many of us have seen in Guatemala. As we continue to add elements to the GV and improve them this year, we'd like to be able to steer church mission teams and other church and community groups to the GV for the learning experience and team-building. The September event will help get us ready for that. Between 9:00 and 2:30 we'll tour the GV, test the learning modules we have for water and biochar, and use our stove for our lunch. When we're done, for those interested, we'll be able to work on the garden and / or other areas.

We're excited at the progress made during this past year, and for the opportunities we have at GV for supporting the mission of the church. And, we're grateful for your continued interest and support.
