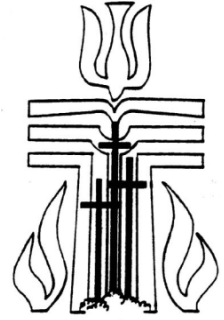

"Hospitality"

PASTOR'S CORNER

Parker J. Palmer, in his book, "Healing the Heart of Democracy," argues that our appreciation of "hospitality" lies at the heart of a healthy Church and a healthy democracy. He shares the examples of Abraham and Sarah (Genesis 18) "who are well into their old age when they make camp in the desert at Mamre. Three strangers approach, and rather than respond in fear, they offer them food and drink. The strangers turn out to be angels of the Lord who make the startling announcement that Sarah, despite her advanced age will bear a child..."

He also recounts the events of Luke 24, where Jesus' apostle's meet a "stranger" on the road to Emmaus. Later, over supper, their eyes are opened to the fact that this stranger is the risen Christ. Palmer points out that, "Had Abraham and Sarah failed to offer hospitality, they would not have played their key roles as the agents of God's promise to the Jewish people and, had the disciples on the road to Emmaus failed to offer hospitality, they could not have played their key roles as bearers of the good news and founders of the early church."

He goes on to say that, "becoming people who offer hospitality to strangers requires us to open our hearts time and again to the tension created by our fear of "the other." But there is always a pay-off. "Hospitality brings gifts to the host as well as the guest- the gift of information that we would otherwise lack and the gift of feeling more at home in a world full of strangers." Be alert to the strangers who share the path. We too may have the privilege of entertaining angels, unaware.

Note from the Associate Pastor



In honor of the arrival of meteorological summer, here's a reflection I wrote (at some point in the past couple of decades) on my years as a summer camp counselor:

The rain had stopped around what must have been sunset, and in the cool early June twilight the smells of earth and new growth were thick in the air. I splashed through the creek called Polly's Branch and hoisted myself up the slippery slope of the left bank, where the trail turns right and follows the creek downstream. Here the floor of the valley is narrow, a miniature flood plain; the ground rises steeply on the left, less so on the right, and the trees are thick—white oaks and tulip poplars and the like.

It was nearly dark. The woods were dripping steadily, and wet branches occasionally pawed at my face and neck. Soon the lazy gurgle of the creek grew louder and into a more hurried splashing. The trail, which had wandered away from the creek bank, snaked back into the shallow bottom, and as I rounded a bend I could make out faintly a pale sloping bulk of rock square in the middle of the creek. Farther downstream, the woods grew thicker and darker, hung with vines and vaguely threatening. I had explored those downstream reaches once or twice in winter but even then had found them tangled and prickly and not amenable to hiking—and certainly not at night with no light.

In any case the trail now left Polly's Branch and climbed steeply out of the bottom, passing through a stand of young planted pines and emerging in a small clearing. Here the path was not recently mowed, the grass tall and wet. Where it crests the hill I looked back to the west; the trailing edge of the rainy day's overcast had cleared the horizon, leaving a deep red, almost brown, gash of dying sunset. Directly overhead a bright star shone through a break in the clouds.

SESSION NOTES

The Session held its regular meeting on May 8. The meeting was opened with a devotional and prayer by Judi Weeter. She reminded the Session members of the attributes of good Christian leaders.

The Session rejoiced in the recent decision of Enrique and Norie Sanchez to become members of Trinity.

Dwight Christenbury brought a request from the youth of Trinity to allow them to hold a Bake Sale fundraiser in order to contribute to the cost of their participation in the Presbytery of Western North Carolina's trip to the Raleigh Youth Mission (July 15–20, 2018). Session approved their request, and expressed enthusiastic support for this youth mission trip.

Mark Stanley extended an invitation to all Session members for the "Healthy Pastors, Healthy Congregations" Initiative that was held at Trinity on April 17, 2018. He also noted that the baptism of Madeline Grace Reider would be taking place on Sunday, May 13th. Madeline is the granddaughter of Ed and Betty Lockwood. Mark announced that Gene Carman's 100th Birthday Party would be held on Friday, May 11. Congratulations to Gene on reaching this milestone in his life. Mark also congratulated Sally Beghtol on her upcoming graduation from the Presbytery Leadership School.

The Session expressed appreciation to Bob Smith for his service on Session and other aspects of Trinity's ministry. Appreciation was also expressed to Gloria for her service as a Deacon. Bob and Gloria will be moving to Virginia at the beginning of June. Replacing Bob and Gloria on Session and Deacons will be Ed and Cheryl Spencer, respectively.

Finally, Mark noted that there is a need for new members on the Building and Grounds Ministry due to some current members moving from the area or otherwise unable to continue serving. Anyone interested in becoming a part of Building and Grounds Ministry can let Mark know.

Finance Ministry reported that YTD income is above budget due to some early Estimate of Giving receipts, and plate and unpledged giving being about \$1,000 over budget. YTD expenses are \$3,149 over budget due primarily to unexpected lighting repair and higher natural gas usage during the recent colder than normal weather. Trinity Preschool expenses are about \$600 higher than income YTD. One Great Hour of Sharing receipts were \$2,230.

The Session, in its role as the Board of the Trinity Presbyterian Corporation approved the recommendation from Personnel and Finance Ministries that Michelle Harris be hired as Trinity's Bookkeeper effective June 1. Also, Sue Robinson was appointed as a teller, effective immediately. These persons are filling vacancies that have recently occurred.

Session discussed the plans that are being made for holding one service at 10 am during the months of June, July and August. It is hoped that this will allow for an enhanced sense of oneness among the members of the congregation, as we all worship together in unity.

recycle – to use more than once; to participate in the organized recovery of used material so that it may be processed and used again

Did you know there is an active recycling program at Trinity?

We have a recycling dumpster and there are a number of places throughout the building where items for recycling can be placed.

two containers at the outer doors as you exit the sanctuary for unwanted bulletins

blue containers in the choir room, library and rooms #207 & #103

large white container in the office next to the small copier

two containers (one for paper, one for cardboard) on the lower level near the doors to pre-school

blue container outside kitchen doors for items from kitchen activities

container labeled “red cups” (usually located near kitchen) for our new red coffee cups

We can recycle:

paper (office, construction, newsprint, magazines) but not tissues, paper towels, aluminum foil, plastic candy wrappers

red coffee cups

cardboard boxes (they need to be broken down flat)

glass bottles and jars (please rinse)

plastic bottles, jars, jugs, clam shells (please rinse)

aluminum and steel cans (please rinse)

Plastic bags can be found on the door between kitchen areas for aluminum cans which are collected each month to help with scholarships for our partnership with Guatemala.

Each time we recycle something, one less item goes to the landfill. Scripture instructs God’s people to be careful with what God has created. *“The earth is the Lord’s, all it contains, the world and all who dwell in it.”* Psalm 24:1.

We encourage the members of our Trinity family to examine this truth for what it is, and to join together in finding ways that we can individually and collectively make a difference in preserving the goodness of God’s creation.

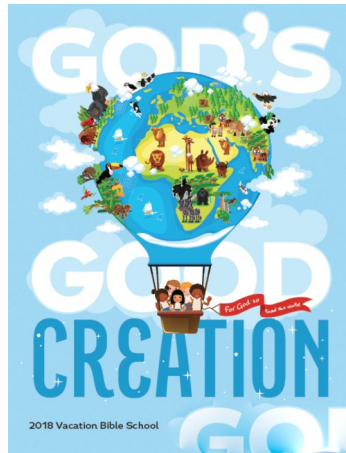


**Recycle Aluminum Cans for Guatemala

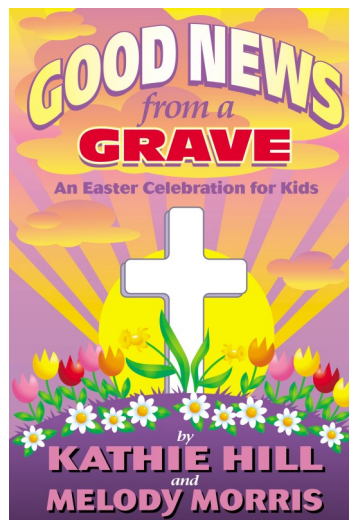

WHY IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING SO PREVALENT IN NORTH CAROLINA

The geographic location of North Carolina, in part, contributes to the high number of victims and survivors living in the state. N.C. lies in the center of the triangle encompassed by Washington, D.C., Charlotte and Atlanta, all of which are hubs of human trafficking. The Cumberland County Sheriff's Department, which has been very aggressive in pursuing human trafficking cases, likes to point out that the half-way point between New York and Miami on I-95 is just north of Fayetteville. The Director of "Project NO REST" at UNC says "A number of advocates have long pointed to the convenience of major highways for transportation, easy access to and from tourist areas, as well as a large military presence associated with greater mobility and a number of adult businesses in the area as factors that increase the level of trafficking.

Large sporting and entertainment arenas that host larger events also attract traffickers, as does the state's busy agricultural industry and large number of agricultural and seasonal workers. It is pointed out that there is a large agricultural community with high demand for manual laborers.

These features make it easy for predators to locate, coerce or seize, move and sell vulnerable victims.

PENTECOST OFFERING TO BE DEDICATED AND RECEIVED ON JUNE 3

The Pentecost offering helps our youth begin life with a strong start – a solid foundation of faith formed in the first third of life, from childhood through young adulthood.

40% of the offering remains with our congregation to support ministries with children and youth in our church and local community. 25% goes to Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) experience. The gifts we give have helped to train and equip volunteers to engage in mission at more than 20 sites in the U.S. and around the world. Other opportunities are provided through the ministry. 25% supports ministries with youth, ages 12-18, and those called to accompany them. 10% supports the "Educate A child, Transform the World" national initiative, which was affirmed at the 221 General Assembly in 2014. The goal of this initiative is to motivate and inspire Presbyterians to better the lives of one million children by 2020.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Some members have requested more information regarding **gifts of stock and other securities** to Trinity. Thanks to Jack Presseau for providing a document from another church for Finance's consideration. Glenn Walker has modified it for Trinity's use. April results: Through 33% of the year, we have collected about 45% of our Estimates of Giving (EOG), again due to the high amount of 2018 EOGs paid in 2017. April expenses were \$760 above budget. Bottom line is ahead of last year. One Great Hour of Sharing receipts are about \$770 below last year.

Interested in Gifting Stocks or Mutual Funds to Trinity Presbyterian Church?

As you may be aware, a gift of appreciated stocks or other securities can generate tax benefits for the donor. To enable us to issue a confirmation for your tax records, we would ask that the following procedures be followed:

SPEAK WITH YOUR BROKER

- > Identify the securities that you want to gift to the Church.
- > Tell your broker that you want the securities to be transferred to an account in the name of the Church at Wells Fargo Advisors (Make sure that your broker understands that you want the securities TRANSFERRED and not SOLD with the proceeds transferred).
- > To properly effect the transfer, please give your broker the following information:

Our Trinity Local Mission Team is again focusing on Habitat for Humanity.

This summer we have another opportunity to assist the building of a third Habitat home at Dodd Meadows in Flat Rock. We are invited to join a faith group made up of volunteers from about 13 churches which provides the primary labor. Habitat hires professional supervisors, and provides simple one-story slab house designs. These are formula houses, with pre-assembled wall and roof sections.

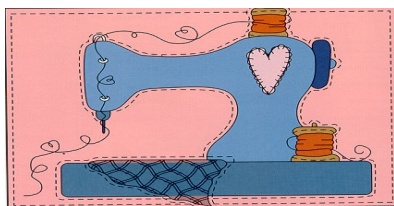
Dodd Meadows is a large project of over 80 houses being sponsored partly by Thrivent Financial. Half the cost of the house comes from a Thrivent Grant and half comes from fund raising. Trinity church has included \$1000 for Habitat in our 2018 Local Mission budget.

Saturday June 2 is the start of the build, with wall raising in the morning. Then after a provided lunch, we will sign the studs with prayers and wishes for the home owner. We will meet the family which will purchase the home with a special Habitat mortgage, and they contribute "sweat equity".

There is a display in the narthex with a sign-up sheet asking us all to put in a few hours on this house over the next 5 months. The work schedule is posted with volunteer opportunities on most Saturdays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. Habitat requires no special skills. If you can walk through mud, push a broom, or swing a hammer or paint brush, you are welcome.

Please help out – this is a great learning and serving experience.

More information: Trinity's middle school and high school youth will head to Raleigh on Sunday, July 15, for a week serving the people of the city, learning about the complex needs of urban communities, and reflecting on their learning, all under the guidance of Raleigh Youth Mission (RYM). RYM is a branch of Youth Mission Co, which sees "mission as God's call in the lives of all people to seek justice, love kindness, and walk humbly in faith; creativity as a tool of understanding and growth because it gets us outside of ourselves and in connection with the Spirit; and transformation to be a lasting change—in a person, a group, a community, a world. It's what God provides when we are open to new possibilities."

Eighty percent of funds raised in the Trinity Youth Bake Sale will help offset the cost of the RYM experience for our young people, while twenty percent will be donated to Safelight.

CEDEPCA social

CEDEPCA, the Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America, is an ecumenical educational organization based in Guatemala City that works to transform lives in Central America. They have four major areas of support.

- **Disaster Ministry**, which works with local communities and churches to prepare for extreme events. Changes in climate have made Guatemala one of the world's most vulnerable countries, and while we can't stop hurricanes, tropical storms, earthquakes, or volcanic eruptions, CEDEPCA's training of prevention and preparation can do much to reduce impact.
- **Intercultural Encounters**, a program that designs experiences of encounter and dialogue between people of the United States and Canada in search of a more equitable and just world. During these experiences, participants and local communities will learn mutually from each other and discover how God is inviting them to work together for transformation in the world.
- **Women's Ministry**, which is committed to educational experiences for women in the region. Activities are designed to empower women to assume their rights, learn to care for themselves, and to take leadership roles in their churches and communities. This ministry has worked with church women, women in the streets, expectant mothers, and community leaders.

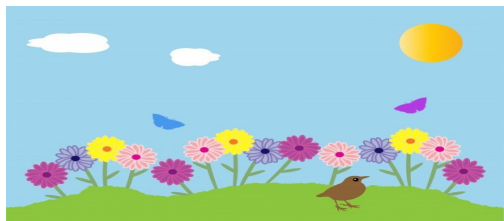
